The Churches of St. Peter and St. Nicholas **Annual Report for 2025**

Background

St. Peter's and St. Nicholas Parochial Church Council has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for St. Peter's Church, Bridge Road, Shaldon and St. Nicholas Church and the Churchyard at Ringmore, Shaldon.

In June 2025, a draft scheme was published with proposals to transfer the parish of Shaldon from the Benefice of Shaldon into the Haldon Team Ministry Benefice. This was followed by a period of public consultation. The PCC passed unanimously a resolution expressing its support for the proposals. During the public consultation period, the Church Commissioners received no representations against the provisions of the draft Pastoral Scheme and they therefore made the scheme which came into effect 25th August 2025. On this date the Rev'd Carol Green formally assumed the role of Rector of the parish.

The PCC is a charity excepted from registration with the Charity Commission.

Its objectives are shared in part by the following related trusts, which are not under the control of the PCC.

Emma Robertson Trust

Bequest from the will of Miss Emma Robertson in 1931. Interest on the capital endowment is to be used for the maintenance of the structure of St. Peter's Church or for such charitable purposes in connection with the church as the trustees at their discretion think fit. The Trust is registered with the Charity Commissioners.

The present trustees are: Chris Morris (Chairman and Treasurer), Lesley Bill, Sue Morris, Frances Commander and Malcolm Watson. The annual meeting was held on 2nd November. During the year the sum of £2,250 was contributed towards the general fund for church expenses. At the annual meeting, the trustees conducted a review of the Objects of the trust, following a request to do so from the PCC. The outcome of the review was that the trustees considered that the Objects provided sufficient flexibility to allow the Trust to continue to operate in the same way as in the past, bearing in mind the perceived wishes of the original benefactors.

Extence Trust

Bequest from the will of Gerald Onslow Extence in 1988. The income and capital is held in trust principally for the upkeep of the Churchyard at St Nicholas Church and for the general charitable purposes of and in the Ecclesiastical parish of St Nicholas, Shaldon as the trustees may agree.

The present trustees are: Chris Morris (Chairman and Treasurer), Lesley Bill, Sue Morris, Frances Commander and Malcolm Watson. The annual meeting was held on 24th November. During the year the sum of £11,400 was contributed towards the general fund for church expenses. This included a grant of £700 specifically for emergency work in St Nicholas' churchyard, following an urgent request from the Standing Committee on 29th June.

At the annual meeting, the trustees conducted a review of the Objects of the trust, following a request to do so from the PCC. The outcome of the review was that the trustees considered that the Objects provided sufficient flexibility to allow the Trust to continue to operate in the same way as in the past, bearing in mind the perceived wishes of the original benefactors.

Any disbursements from the two trusts are accounted as income in the PCC accounts.

Team Rector's Report for the Haldon Mission Community Churches

“To the church of God that is in Teignmouth, Bishop., Shaldon, Ideford, Luton and Ashcombe, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ” (from 1 Corinthians)

Today is one of those first days of this year which feels like spring is properly ready to embrace us.

Not only are the spring flowerbeds looking gorgeous - as witnessed in the beautiful Mothering Sunday bouquets- but the sun is genuinely warm after many weeks of chill and damp murkiness.

The weather helps of course but I have been seeing a new “spring-like” confidence in our church communities. A growing spirit of *can-do*, with people thinking how can I build up the church. Less asking who will do it but instead thinking maybe God is sending me so *let it be me*. How hopeful that is and what opportunities it brings us. As our new Archbishop Sarah likes to say – “let’s roll up our sleeves and get on with it”.

My sense of the Haldon Mission Community has always been one of 8 individual churches looking to one another in Christian fellowship to strengthen His kingdom where we are. In the first place each church has its own heart and personality and gives its members a place to call home. Then in recognition of our calling as Christ’s disciples we look for ways to support and serve one another and our wider community. In the last year it has been encouraging to meet again as a Team Council sharing stories, praying and dwelling in the Spirit.

In late August the last part of the legal framework was put in place for Shaldon Parish to become part of our Mission Community. This coming together has allowed us to pool expertise and resources.

Our excellent Team administrator Sarah has worked with Andy Harding to produce an invoicing system for all funerals and weddings. Increased use of the website calendar has helped this. She is also assisting your clergy in putting together service rotas, producing pew sheets and orders of service to enhance our worship. This admin support has meant Dave and I have more time as your spiritual leaders.

Other ways in which thinking Team wide has helped is noticeably in the area of pastoral care. I hope you saw the Team photo our Christmas bulletin. This team has proved to be flexible, compassionate and willing to listen to find new ways to serve – they work supporting the clergy gathering up lost sheep and binding the wounds of the grieving, sick and hurting. Our regular prayers together, discussion and training have strengthened service. We cover around 9 care homes and 30 church at home members every month. This is a huge achievement and I thank them for their service throughout the parishes.

Our children’s and youth work is also benefitting from being a Benefice-wide project. We are blessed with many schools in our Benefice and they are open to us visiting them and telling the Christian story. As a result of our outreach work the Diocese has secured funding of around ¼ million pounds over the next 5 years from the central church. This is an amazing gift and opportunity. We will be able to appoint a Growing Faith Worker to help develop our work with families and young people. We will also advertise again for a part time priest to support all that we are doing.

Having a broader vision of church is working for us. Over the next few years, we will need to look more into our governance and other structures to see how we can work more effectively across all the parishes. Next year I intend having one date for all parishes for their APCM where we gather in one building to cover the business in parish groups and spend the second part of the meeting together sharing good news and making plans for our future.

I want also to take this opportunity to thank all of you for supporting your church with your prayers, time, giving and presence. I want to especially thank Rev. Dave, the retired clergy, Licensed Lay Ministers, Churchwardens and officers, Safeguarding lead Sue and Sarah for your unstinting help and support of our churches.

Committees

The PCC operates through a Standing and Finance Committee, which meets when required between full meetings of the PCC. The only committee required by law is a Standing Committee.

It has the power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council. Formerly, the PCC also appointed a Finance Committee to oversee the general financial dimension of the work of St. Peter's and St. Nicholas by monitoring income and expenditure, producing the annual budgets and managing the Planned Giving Fund. The PCC decided in 2007 that these functions would be better combined in a single Standing & Finance Committee. Its members are the Rector (ex officio), the Churchwardens, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Mr Keith Robinson, and Mrs Frances Commander who would represent the financial aspects.

Church Attendance

Church attendance figures remain largely unchanged over the year. Regular Sunday worship in Shaldon has followed the traditional pattern appropriate for our longstanding but ageing congregations.

A new initiative, "Create Church" has been introduced which is aimed at trying to attract a younger and new group of Sunday worshippers. (See paragraph below).

Special worship opportunities such as our Crib and Christingle service do attract larger attendances (197 in December 2025) and are much appreciated by many people in the village.

We continue to try to make activities involving the younger generation welcome; the concerts involving the Teignmouth Youth Choir and links to Shaldon School and the Pre-school need to continue to be fostered and we do have a good reputation for this.

Electoral Roll

The Church Electoral Roll was renewed on 22nd March 2025, the old Roll being discarded as is required every six years. Everyone on the old Roll was contacted and invited to apply again for inclusion on the new Roll. All other members of the congregation were also invited to apply.

As at the date of publication of the new Roll, there were 51 names on the Roll, of whom 36 are resident in the parish and 15 non-resident.

This compares with 54 on the old Roll, but the Electoral Roll Officer pointed out that it is important to remember that all the names on the new Roll are newly-added.

The Rev'd Prebendary Philip Luff and the Rev'd Caroline Luff

The PCC records with great regret the deaths on 29th May of the Rev'd Prebendary Phillip Luff and on 26th October of the Rev'd Caroline Luff. Both Caroline and Philip contributed so much and over so many years to the life of Shaldon parish, to the life of the Haldon Mission Community and to the wider church and local communities. They were both much loved and will be sadly missed.

Review of the year

The full PCC met four times during the year (including the meeting after the APCM) with an average attendance of 84.00%.

Other items of business were conducted by correspondence in accordance with Rule M29 of the Church Representation Rules 2025.

The Standing and Finance Committee met between the PCC meetings when required and reported its deliberations to the subsequent meeting of the PCC.

The principal items for the PCC's attention this year have been:

Thanks to other clergy and members of the laity

The PCC wishes to place on record its thanks to those members of the clergy whose contributions have enabled continuation of the full range of services. We are indebted to the Rev'd Sue Astbury, the Rev'd Helena Cermakova, the Rev'd Jack Eastwood, the Rev'd Caroline Luff, the Rev'd Paul Smedley and Fr Brett Ward.

Our gratitude is also extended to Licensed Lay Ministers and other members of the laity, including Lesley Heffer, Hugh McCormick, Ruth Sewell and Peter Wood who undertake a range of tasks, including leading worship.

Churchyard, Ringmore

Following a public meeting on 10th April, a Churchyard Care Group was formed and Nia Pearson agreed to lead the group. She reports that an average of nineteen volunteers come to the monthly meeting, working for 90 minutes followed by refreshments. Most of the team are not members of the church community and Nia has worked to generate a feeling of belonging and fellowship, even if it is mainly by email. She comments that the art of electronic letter writing is not to be underestimated. The group has systematically worked its way around the churchyard to clear, tidy and reclaim areas that had been left untended for many years.

Besides reclaiming untended areas, overgrown shrubs have been pruned, hedges have been replanted, habitats for bugs and beetles have been created and composting facilities have been formed. All of these are well used.

The Group acknowledges the support of the Parish Council for funds to buy hand tools and the PCC for investing in Teignbridge Green Recycling Scheme.

The group works in tandem with the paid contractor. A three-year plan has been devised for a long-term churchyard care strategy.

The PCC records its gratitude to all those providing care for Churchyard and is appreciative of how much time and effort has been devoted to this work.

Musical Events in St. Peter's

The PCC is pleased to report that a number of musical events took place in the church during the year. The Shaldon Singers gave their two usual concerts, a Spring Concert in May, which featured Haydn's *Creation* and a Christmas concert in December which included four well-known anthems. There was also a choral workshop arranged by the Shaldon Singers in April in which over 120 singers participated. The work studied and performed was Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, directed by Brian Kay.

The Shaldon Festival in June featured a sell-out performance by the vocal group VOCES8, a concert by The Paddington Trio, 2025 winners of The Parkhouse Award, and a piano recital given by Martin James Bartlett, a former winner of the BBC Young Musician of the Year. The Festival also hosted an invitation-only solo violin recital in November for the benefit of the Festival Friends, given by Joel Munday.

The Mardi Gras Jazz Evening on 13th February, with John Shillito and his Riviera Ramblers raised £545 for the Shaldon Playpark Renovation Project. Regretfully this was the final such occasion owing to the recent sad death of the Riviera Rambler's leader, John Shillito.

Other events included a "Granny Galactica" concert given by South Devon Community Choir, a concert by the Torbay Symphony Orchestra, two concerts by the Teignmouth Youth Choir, the second in conjunction with Rowcroft Hospice Choir and Brixham Orpheus Male Voice Choir, and a joint concert given by Red Rock Acapella and the Torbay Police Choir.

There was also a series of five lunch-time organ recitals, highlighting St. Peter's renowned organ, on Wednesdays in July, given by Derek Whitty, Andrew Teague, Stephen Wellington, Michael Farley and Ian Bartlett. These were well attended and raised £402.50, which was shared between the Teignmouth Youth Choir and St Peter's Church, specifically for maintenance of the organ.

St. Peter's choir is still looking for new members and there are vacancies in all parts.

The PCC would like to express appreciation for the considerable voluntary time and effort expended in organising and staging these events.

Fund Raising Activities: Annual Soup Kitchen

The Annual Soup Kitchen took place outside the Pharmacy before Christmas and raised £562. This was divided between Factory Row and HITS. We are always grateful to Tim at Ode and Gino from The Clipper who have supported us for many years, and this year to Tim from the London Inn who volunteered to join our efforts. Claire Stoye and Wenna Curry also provided soups. Thanks are due to Sue Mullins at the Pharmacy for kindly allowing us to invade her forecourt once again.

Create Church

This year St Peters started a once a month all age service called 'Create Church'. This was put in place to attract younger people, families, new people and to introduce some variety of worship services St Peters gives to its local parish. The service is lively and features some worship songs, a bible story, prayer, an interactive element with craft and discussion. A couple of new families have joined us and some new adults who enjoy the informality of create church. The atmosphere is one of laughter and friendliness which is attractive and provides an easy place to invite people who have never been to church before.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

On 25th January there was a service at St Peter's as part of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Quiet Day

On 20th February a Quiet Day in the Ignatian Tradition was held at St Peter's, led by Nicola Smedley. The theme was *Come Follow Me".

Lent Course 2025

A small group met during Lent under Rev'd. Carol's direction to look at the journeys of Saint Paul. As always with such groups there were some very helpful discussions about our faith and the challenges we face.

Rev'd Carol Green

On 10th April there was a service of Holy Communion to mark 20 years of Rev'd Carol's ordination as a priest.

Experience Easter

Experience Easter was a massive undertaking and a huge success seeing around 150 children visit the church over the week. With different interactive stations setup telling the Easter story the children had a chance to have a last supper, paint stones, sit in an indoor garden and hear many Bible stories. It was a great outreach to the primary school, local scout groups, the preschool and a good confidence builder for many of those involved. Thanks are due to all the volunteers who helped to decorate the church and deliver this event. Pastoral Reorganization

On 31st August a special service was held at St Peter's to celebrate Shaldon parish officially joining the Haldon Mission Community. This was attended by the Venerable Douglas Dettmer, Archdeacon of Totnes and the Venerable Andrew Beane, Archdeacon of Exeter to mark the transition between archdeaconries.

All Souls Thanksgiving service

A service of Thanksgiving was held at St Nicholas on 2nd November to remember by name departed loved ones.

Study Day

On 4th December a Study Day on the Nicene Creed was led by Fr Brett Ward.

Saturday Coffee Mornings.

It is hard to believe that we first heard of the Ukraine / Russian war some four years ago and thank the church for their continued support.

Each Saturday morning free tea and coffee is offered to all, towards which donations are accepted. A group of elderly Ukrainian ladies enjoy sitting together and chattering in their own language as English is still difficult for some. There are also a number of other local folk who are not regular church goers that pop in and join us, and one of them has arranged a couple of Sunday outings for the group.

A special mention goes to Sheila Green who never fails to constantly bring the most delicious delicacies and we should like to give her our sincere thanks. A good time is had by all.

I'm sure everyone joins with us in hopes and prayers for peace.

Links with Shaldon Primary School

This year we again welcomed the School Harvest and Christmas celebrations to St. Peter's. The Harvest retiring collection raised £201.60 for Shelter Box and the Christmas Retiring collection raised £189.30 for church funds.

We recognize the importance attached to maintaining links with the Primary School through "Open the Bible" and the school's use of St. Peter's for seasonal celebrations. The school has recently requested the opportunity to add an "Easter Celebration" to its longstanding Harvest & Christmas events and a positive response has been given to this request. Whether this will bear any wider fruit remains to be seen.

Crib and Christingle Service

The attendance at the Crib and Christingle service which took place on Christmas Eve was 197. This raised £130.06 for the Church of England Children's Society.

Praise Services at St Nicholas.

The collection at the St Nicholas Easter Praise Service raised £63.50 for the Alice Cross Centre and £63.50 for the Churchyard fund.

The collection at the St Nicholas Harvest Praise Service raised 130.19 for ShelterBox.

The collection at the St Nicholas Christmas Praise Service raised £235.00 for ShelterBox.

Voluntary activities

The PCC wishes to thank those regrettably diminishing numbers of people who help to maintain the life of the churches within the parish including those who act as Sidespersons, those who read lessons at our various services, those who do intercessions on a monthly basis, and our choir and servers. Without their dedication our worship would be much diminished. The PCC also thanks those who give their time to clean the churches and their contents, those providing flower arrangements, the Sacristans, who do so much that many people are completely unaware of, those involved in the production and distribution of the "Parish News" and those who organise special services.

At St. Nicholas, special thanks go to those who give their time to select and organise the music and, in the absence of a live organist, operate the organ for regular Sunday services.

Flower Team.

Flowers enhance the worship of the church and to that end it has been the aim of the flower team to make sure that there are flowers in church throughout the year. This has been achieved and members of the congregation have appreciated this effort.

The team strives to keep within a strict budget and make efforts to compost spent flowers. They are also attempting to become more sustainable by using vases instead of oasis and by using garden flowers in their arrangements.

Thanks for their efforts are due to this willing and enthusiastic team..

Independent Examiner

Brian Hamblin was appointed as Independent Examiner (as defined by the Charities Act 1993) at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 12th April 2025.

Finance

2025 has again seen the church finances run at a loss.

Looking at the financial statement, receipts on giving are similar to 2024 but overall, less has been received, partly due to not as much grant money from the Emma Robertson and Extence Trust being requested.

Payments are less than the previous year. Our Common Fund contribution increased by about £2300 but other than the church running costs ie electricity, gas and water, which have risen significantly our overall costs are less than in 2024. There is still a deficit in the running costs of the Shaldon and Ringmore Parish News. This needs to be addressed in the coming year with the aim of at least breaking even.

As a result of the initial meeting about the churchyard at St Nicholas last April and the setting up of the care group to work on the churchyard, there has been an increase in the income specifically given for the maintenance of the area. Some of these are regular givers and these donations can be gift aided. This has offset the cost of the grass cutting and hedge trimming

Most of our giving can be gift aided and thanks are due to Keith Robinson for making the regular submissions to claim this from HMRC.

The contactless device has proved a useful addition and is especially useful when we have big events, for example the school concerts and Christingle Service.

Our charity giving has been good and we have done some fund raising for the church, namely the organ recitals in the summer. The church has been used for many outside events, which contributes to our income.

Looking forward, we need to address the fact that we spend more than we receive. We can keep using our reserves, but these are diminishing.

Deanery Synod Report

Kenn Deanery Synod has met three times during the year. At the first meeting Rev'd Dave Wilkie gave a presentation on contact with young families. This led to an interesting discussion on how the churches in the deanery are meeting that challenge. The second meeting at St. Peter's was led by Sophie Phillips the New Zero Carbon officer of the diocese. All the parishes were doing something under this heading, including Shaldon where the churchyard project was praised. At the October meeting the Rt Reverend Dr Mike Harrison, Bishop of Exeter spoke to the meeting and answered a variety of questions in a very friendly and supportive manner.

During the year our Deanery Synod representative, Keith Robinson, became the Lay Chair of the Deanery Synod. There is a vacancy for another person from the parish to join the Deanery Synod.

Future of the Church Group

This small group appointed by the PCC met three times during the year to look at the ways in which we engage with the wider community, in particular young people. We have given full support to the Create Church initiative. Among other events which engage with the wider community are the Remembrance Day service, the Praise services at St. Nicholas Church, the Good Friday ecumenical walk of witness and service and the pop-up café at St. James with which members of our congregation help.

The way ahead for this group is currently under review.

Safeguarding representative's report

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016. (This is a duty to have due regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

Sue Harvey continues to be the reporting officer for safeguarding concerns for our Mission Community. No significant concerns have been reported to our Diocesan Safeguarding Team; however, advice has been sought regarding individual challenges which have occurred. These matters are being monitored by our Clergy.

Everyone is asked to continue to be vigilant regarding all aspects of abuse, including coercive control, financial dominance and abuse of power. All concerns are referred to the Diocesan team for guidance.

Sue Harvey continues to be also the source data verifier for all DBS checks that take place. There have been some recent changes in the processing of these checks, and Sue is currently updating her training/understanding of these changes. As soon as a DBS application is made on the 318 DBS website, she is sent an automatic request to verify the source data. Until this is done, the application is not completed.

She thanks everyone for their continued support, and for making our churches a safe place of worship.

Our Team Administrator, Sarah Whitty, is responsible for keeping our Dashboards up to date and is working on re-approving policies once they have been checked again meaning that more actions can be ticked off. At every PCC meeting the issues of training and compliance need to be addressed so that information can be fed back to Sarah.

Churchwarden's Fabric Report 2025

St Peter's

Prior to the Quinquennial Inspection, three issues were known to need investigation and remedial work (namely the floor of the Disabled WC, a leak through the Vestry WC roof and refurbishment of the external store vacated by the Pre-School) but it was felt that it would be best to find out first whether there were any other issues revealed by the inspection that should be sensibly addressed at the same time. From a preliminary perusal of the Surveyor's report there are no additional urgent matters requiring attention. The replacement of the gas Central Heating Boiler, replacement of the main lighting system and associated works to the Font area remain major projects that need to be progressed.

The outstanding 2021 Quinquennial recommendations for work by the stonemason have now been completed.

St Nicholas

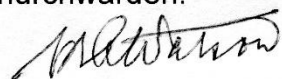
Work has been successfully carried out to replace the organ system for playing recorded music and the existing recordings have now been transferred from diskettes to a USB memory stick; a remaining problem with the Swell pedal is in the course of being resolved. In the course of carrying out the Quinquennial Inspection, an area of the nave floorboarding has been discovered to be affected by rot and investigations are in hand to address this. There are no other unexpected issues raised by the Quinquennial report.

The establishment of a volunteer group to undertake regular churchyard maintenance under the supervision of Nia Pearson has been a major success.

Both Churches

General annual maintenance work has been carried out and the annual fire extinguisher and PAT testing of the electrical appliances took place. Quinquennial Inspections of both churches fell due in 2025 and have been carried out by our regular Surveyor, Mark Ledgard of Savills.
